



Competition.

On Sunday, sound checks were offered on Site 1 as a courtesy. Sound checks will be mandatory at the finals. No pilot can win a trophy at our Nats with a plane that does not meet all of the criteria AMA establishes for safe flight.



We are welcoming back many, many pilot friends who have flown at AMA's IAC. This year, the Team Selection aspect of our annual contest shows so many highly talented pilots. The judges will have their hands full to select only three from such a good representation of this year's aerobatics pilots. The judges will also have a new task to select a new "Junior" pilot to send to the world championship.

Competitors don't just decide one afternoon that they will compete in AMA's Nats. Months, and even years, go into the preparation for this competition. Even-numbered years are even more special because on even years, we also select the next US team to compete in the world championship the following year.

Danny Landis, a regular Nats competitor, arrived for Sunday morning practice at 6:30. It was raining out. By 8:30, things were drying up, so it was time for Danny to get in some early morning practice.



Some of our pilots got some international practice by flying in the French Nationals earlier this spring. Yes, they did a lot of sightseeing, but flying was their primary goal. Mark Hunt finished eighth among a most impressive field of French pilots. Mark had a great time meeting new pilots and making new friends.

Sadly, one other "regular" Nats competitor, Ron VanPutte, will not be returning either. Ron passed away since the last Nats. We will all miss Ron, especially his longtime flying partner, John Fuqua. Albert Glenn has dedicated this year's competition to Ron.
